President's Column

Happy New Year! It is hard for me to believe that 2008 has come and gone. I truly enjoyed my "job" as president of the chapter, and look forward to another year. Each of last year's officers was re-elected for 2009, so we have a seasoned group of folks ready to go right to work.

The biggest event for the early part of 2009 will be a new Master Naturalist Training Class. The first class will be held at the Bastrop State Park Refectory on January 26th. Feel free to come to that kick-off meeting if you'd like to help welcome the new class. We're still looking for a couple of folks to help with refreshments that evening, so let me know if you can assist.

Our first club activity of the year will be on Saturday, January 17, 2009. We will be placing trail markers and doing general clean-up of the Carrizo Trail in Bastrop State Park. This project goes back many years with our chapter, and we are looking forward to getting it completed. We'll be setting some park-supplied signage in masonry bases, raking up debris on the trail, and pulling out some invasive Japanese Honeysuckle and English Ivy. Bring work gloves, rakes, loppers, and other general yardwork tools. We'll begin at 9:00 a.m. and plan to finish up around noon. We'll meet at the interpretive trail parking area. To get there, make a right turn on Park Road 1A just past the golf pro shop. Follow the road around for a short distance and you'll find the parking area. It is just before the turn-in for the Copperas Creek Camping Area.

We will be getting a similar project underway at Lockhart State Park on Saturday, January 31st. The folks at the park have asked our chapter to begin planning on a new Interpretive Trail for their park. This workday will be the initial walk-through to get the process of designing and installing the new trail underway. We'll begin at 9:00 a.m. and likely finish before noon.

Stay tuned for an announcement of a clean-up day at the Colorado River Refuge and adjoining property. Club member Dale Morrison has done an extensive amount of trail work out there, and notes that there are a few items that he could use help with. Things like clearing some brush, removing a few items of trash, and cutting some grapevine. This workday is tentatively scheduled for February 14th. More details to come.

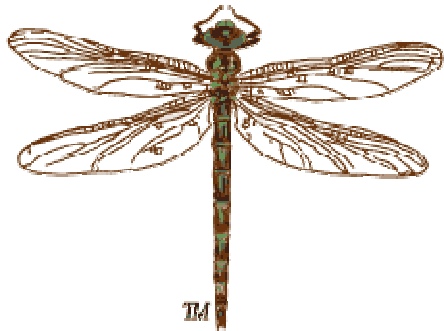
